 Heritage Nepean Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee Meeting- Meeting Notes - March 1, 2000 Réunion du Comité consultatif local sur la conservation de l'architecture de Nepean - Procès-verbal - Le 1^{er} mars 2000

We are a committee composed of representatives from the nine Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committees (LACACs) in the Ottawa-Carleton Region. Realising that it is possible the current LACACs will not continue to exist after January 1, 2001 and that collectively we posses significant heritage resources, we have come together to formulate recommendations about heritage conservation in the new City. It is our intention to produce a report that outlines our present mandates, past activities and makes specific recommendations for future action. Please accept this as our Letter of Intent to file a written submission and to request an opportunity to present our report to the Ottawa Transition Board.

LACACs are municipally appointed bodies which advise municipal councils on the protection, conservation and preservation of local heritage. Authority for these activities is derived from the Ontario Heritage Act. More than 70 citizens have volunteered their time and knowledge to help ensure that heritage conservation is a significant priority in the region of Canada's capital.

On March 1, 2000 the City of Nepean LACAC hosted a meeting at which representatives from regional LACACs met to discuss a plan of action. More than 40 area LACAC members met and, with the assistance of Mr. John Ota, LACAC Advisor, Ministry of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation, initiated a process that will culminate in a report detailing recommendations for heritage conservation in the new City.

At the first meeting it was decided that a committee comprised of the Chairs from the Region's LACACs would convene to develop further policies and plans. These initiatives will then be reviewed by each LACAC. We plan to keep you advised of our progress. We will ensure that the Transition Team is aware of what we do and of our deep concern that this region's heritage continue to be protected in the future.

The meeting was called to order by Chair Johnston at 7:05 p.m.

01 **Opening Comments**

Chair Allan Johnston, Nepean Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee, (LACAC) welcomed everyone to the meeting, and noted that this is an opportunity to discuss what form of representation local LACACs would like to have under the new City, and to lobby for this vision.

Mr. John Ota, LACAC Advisor, Ministry of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation, noted that the success of LACACs in the new one City greatly depends on a cooperative effort. He added that the fact that LACACs have gathered here from across the Region bodes well for all involved. He noted that it is obvious everyone present cares deeply about the protection of their LACAC, and more so about the protection of heritage properties, in their areas and at large.

Mr. Ota advised that it is very important during amalgamation that people take a pro-active position. He added providing the transition team with structure and mandate suggestions will have a favourable impression with the Ottawa Transition Board. He noted that in Chatham/Kent, LACACs halted all LACAC activities during the transitional year, waiting for instructions from the Team. This created great difficulties a year later in trying to re-establish an active LACAC, therefore it is very important LACACs keep their momentums going.

Councillor Harder noted that the experts in the field of heritage are present, and they, better than anyone else, know what needs to be done to ensure LACAC mandates are protected along with heritage properties. She added that their collective voices will carry a lot of weight with the Board and congratulated everyone on taking this first step.

02 Amalgamation

- <u>Models available include</u>:
 - Heritage Board consisting of three voting members, with community panels that are responsible for investigating Heritage Designation requests

Item No. 02 cont'd:

- Heritage Board consisting of a person from each of the original municipalities, working with Community Panels (Toronto Model)
- In Norfolk, the Special Advisor is recommending amalgamating the (five/six) municipalities into two, with two LACACs for each municipality. Each LACAC would then be left to continue day to day operations as in the past.
- In London, the LACAC has been reformulated with members from various professional fields (Architect, Museum, etc.)

General Discussion

• Goal is to take the politics out of this discussion and focus on the following two items of concern:

1. Financial requirements of LACACs - (what does each LACAC now receive)

- 2. Programs What programs have LACACs initiated, or are going to initiate
- Pool the responses together and formulate a solid plan as to what LACACs are not willing to give up in either of these areas. Safe guard money and programs and from their focus on a new formation of LACACs.
- Concern expressed that street names do not have to be changed, particularly in the areas where street names have historical significance.
- Volunteer contribution/factor cannot be lost in this process, without volunteers, LACACs would not exist. Some form of formal recognition must be established to ensure they are acknowledged for their important contribution to LACACs. Cost of volunteer work is untold.

- Keep volunteers at its maximum.
- LACACs are driven by the people working on them.
- Meeting is good first start, next step, let the Ottawa Transition Board know LACACs are meeting and they wish to be part of the formal structure
- Find out who the Sub-Committee member is for this municipality and request a formal presentation, as well as the Heritage representative on the Ottawa Transitional Board.
- Speak with Osgoode Township and City of Kanata, make sure they are advised of these meetings and know they are invited to participate.
- If Ottawa needs \$125,000 to cover its heritage objectives now, as one city, this number will obviously have to increase substantially to ensure local Ontario heritage is not lost or damaged.

Item No. 02 cont'd:

- Purpose of amalgamation is to save money, this is not to be equated with cutting back on level of current services.
- All information must be verified and accurately reported before a formal presentation can be made to the transition board more meetings will be necessary.
- Sub-committee made up of one member from each LACAC/area to look over various LACAC areas (structures, programs, mandates, finances, etc.)
- Financial requirements need to capture costs of staff and other related expenses (i.e. plaques, programs, advertising, etc.)

- All the above reflects common goals that could be grouped as:

- \Rightarrow Public Relations

- Establish Sub-committee to gather necessary information, to prepare formal submission to the Ottawa Transition Board.
- Surveys are a good way to gather information on heritage and merit properties across the region to present to the Transition Board. Succinct listing.
- Need to define "what the new LACAC is going to deal with", before "how they are to be organized".
- People who have the decision making (voting privileges) on a Heritage Board are not necessarily the ones who do the work/research that goes into brining an item forward, reviewing an item that has been brought forward.
- More reasonable to expect LACACs with a lower degree of program initiatives to be brought up to meet those with a higher level.

Next Step - Submission

- Important Ottawa Transition Board is made aware of LACACs, their mandates, and intentions. Letter of Intent to be forwarded to the Transition Board member who is responsible for the Heritage portfolio. Will advise of LACACs and voluntary initiatives to come up with a recommendation on merging all of them.
- If each member of the LACAC signs a report that goes to Board, it will have an impact
- Pursue meeting with Transition Board member Item No. 02 cont'd:
- Important to bring forward a report to the Board, created by the experts who have worked with LACACs and historical issues then to have this area reviewed by people who are not experts.
- Everyone present has a common goal: Want to preserve heritage and the manner in which it has been protected.
- As of January 1/2000 all LACACs will cease to exist, important that the Transition Board know it is an important advisory body and should be maintained in some form under the new City.
- LACACs provide a viable service to the community and therefore would likely not be

viewed as something that is not needed.

- Transition team cares about volunteers LACACs are for the most part, supported by volunteers.
- Fear that National Capital Commission could be falsely seen as a replacement for LACACs despite the fact that their mandate has shown they do not protect heritage properties, including their own.
- With the increased ward sizes, the new City will need all the volunteers it can get to ensure issues are not lost, and services are provided at the local level.
- Have to be able to defend how much money LACACs need.
- Letter of Intent note LACACs wish to make a formal presentation, at the latest date possible and their ongoing schedule of meetings.
- Invite transition board member to a meeting.
- Time-lines are very tight. Must be prepared, at the latest, to bring forward the report by September.
- Chairs from each LACAC to meet and, establish a plan of action. Formation of subcommittees to investigate and draft report for areas identified by the chairs.

Reasons Behind Recommendation

The building at 344 Gladstone Avenue is designated under Part V of the Ontario Heritage Act as part of the Centretown Heritage Conservation District through by-law 269-97. It was rated as a Group 3 building of some heritage interest dating from approximately 1899. The building was substantially altered through the change of the original gabled roof to a flat-roofed third storey. The proposed alteration would add a private roof-top deck and exercise area as an extension to the building owner's existing third floor apartment. The first two floors of the building are occupied by the owner's business.

The 1997 Centretown Heritage Conservation District Study by Julian Smith and Associates provides the following guideline with respect to additions to a heritage residential property converted to office use:

"Where new additions or alterations are introduced, they should be of sympathetic contemporary design, distinguishable from the original but compatible in form and detail. They should not detract from or overpower the original."

Approval of this roof-top addition is recommended because the original heritage building has been extensively compromised to the point that the reinstatement of the original roof configuration is unlikely. The proposed addition, while not complementing the original 1890's building, would not detract from the renovated building as it currently exists and would not detract from the Centretown streetscape.

Consultation

Adjacent property owners, tenants as well as local business and community associations were notified by letter of the date of the LACAC meeting and the Planning and Economic Development Committee meeting and were provided with comment forms to be returned to LACAC. This is in accordance with City Council's public participation policy regarding alterations to designated heritage buildings (PDD/PPP/N&C #9).





Location Map



Building Elevation (Gladstone)




Building Elevations (side and rear)

We are a committee composed of representatives from the nine Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committees (LACACs) in the Ottawa-Carleton Region. Realising that it is possible the current LACACs will not continue to exist after January 1, 2001 and that collectively we posses significant heritage resources, we have come together to formulate recommendations about heritage conservation in the new City. It is our intention to produce a report that outlines our present mandates, past activities and makes specific recommendations for future action. Please accept this as our Letter of Intent to file a written submission and to request an opportunity to present our report to the Ottawa Transition Board.

LACACs are municipally appointed bodies which advise municipal councils on the protection, conservation and preservation of local heritage. Authority for these activities is derived from the Ontario Heritage Act. More than 70 citizens have volunteered their time and knowledge to help ensure that heritage conservation is a significant priority in the region of Canada's capital.

On March 1, 2000 the City of Nepean LACAC hosted a meeting at which representatives from regional LACACs met to discuss a plan of action. More than 40 area LACAC members met and, with the assistance of Mr. John Ota, LACAC Advisor, Ministry of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation, initiated a process that will culminate in a report detailing recommendations for heritage conservation in the new City.

At the first meeting it was decided that a committee comprised of the Chairs from the Region's LACACs would convene to develop further policies and plans. These initiatives will then be reviewed by each LACAC. We plan to keep you advised of our progress. We will ensure that the Transition Team is aware of what we do and of our deep concern that this region's heritage continue to be protected in the future.

The Ottawa Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee(LACAC) reviewed your proposal or the widening of Laurier Bridge, as it was presented at the Public Advisory Committee meeting on February 16, 2000.
