SUBJECT: **REPORT - RICHMOND HEIGHTS APARTMENTS**

As you are aware, Mr. Dan Found of the Richmond Heights apartments requested that the 9-1-1 management board approve the installation of a 9-1-1 calling station in the apartment entry system.

I had several conversations with Mr. Found to discuss concerns that I had, including the 2-minute time-out feature employed by the entry system and the lack of call-back capability. We also discussed the possibility that the system may be open to abuse by non-resident individuals.

Subsequently, a memorandum of understanding drawn up by regional legal was signed by Mr. Found. He also undertook to inform all of the apartment residents of the system, and installed a notice in the lobby area. Testing took place in June, and the system was activated shortly thereafter.

I spoke with Mr. Found on Friday 13th September. He told me that as far as he was concerned, it was working very well. He has had no negative feedback from the residents and there appears to have been no nuisance use of the system. From the point of view of the 9-1-1 bureau, there has not been any 9-1-1 calls. This would indicate that there are no problems to date and I would therefore recommend that this experiment continue.
