REPORT RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Corporate Services and Economic Development Committee recommend Council approve:

- 1. the Citizens' Review Panel on Local Government Restructuring in Ottawa-Carleton: Work and Consultation Plan attached as Annex A;
- 2. the Budget in support of the Workplan, in the amount of \$250,000 as detailed in the attached Annex B of which 50 percent is payable by the RMOC, with 50 percent allocated between the City of Ottawa and the area municipalities represented by the Ottawa-Carleton Mayors Forum.

BACKGROUND

On Tuesday, 12 August 1997, the Ottawa-Carleton Governance Selection Panel announced the thirteen appointments made to the Citizens' Review Panel on Governance in Ottawa-Carleton as follows:

The mission statement of the Panel is to create a model of local governance that will enable the growth and development of Ottawa-Carleton as a healthy community that balances economic, social and environmental requirements as it moves forward into the 21st century. Information on the Panel's vision, goals and criteria for the model of governance is outlined in Annex A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

At its meeting of 12 March 1997, Regional Council approved an amount of \$75,000 (Motion No. 69) to be provided from the Region-Wide Capital Reserve Fund. Motion 69 also directed that it would be acceptable if the area municipalities collectively wished to provide 50% of the above noted amount. As noted on Annex B, the \$75,000 allocation forms part of the \$250,000, budget. Accordingly, the RMOC portion of the \$250,000 proposed budget is \$125,000.

CONCLUSION

The Panel has been meeting since 4 September, 1997 and has subsequently established its Work and Consultation Plan and Budget as attached as Annexes A and B to this report. The Chief Administrative Officers for the RMOC, City of Ottawa and the Ottawa-Carleton Mayors Forum, met with the Citizens' Panel and are in agreement with the attached report. Following consideration by Regional Council the Work Plan and Budget, will be presented to the Ottawa-Carleton Mayors' Forum and the City of Ottawa for approval.

The Citizens' Review Panel on Local Governance in Ottawa-Carleton Work and Consultation Plan and Budget

Mission

The Panel's mission is to create a model of local governance that will enable the growth and development of Ottawa-Carleton as a healthy community that balances economic, social and environmental requirements as it moves forward into the 21st century.

Vision

The model of governance envisaged by the Panel will motivate Ottawa-Carleton to continue evolving as a place that is internationally recognized for its quality of life, variety of opportunities, justice, caring, highly qualified workforce, safety, prosperity, and natural environment.

<u>Goal</u>

The Panel will seek to develop a recommended design that is more than a compromised blending of all that they hear in their consultations with citizens. The Citizens' Panel will engage Ottawa-Carleton residents in meaningful discussions that will serve to better inform and educate people about how local government works. The Panel's goal is to create an integrated model they believe will best serve the citizens of Ottawa-Carleton.

Criteria for the model of governance

The Panel believes the following to be the basic criteria for a new model of governance:

Accessible:	easy citizen access to the elected and staff decision-makers who are responsible for municipal services
Inclusive:	recognition of communities as an important component of decision- making
Representative:	fair and democratic citizen representation
Comprehensive:	addresses all municipal functions and services; ensures service delivery at a level communities believe to be appropriate; identifies clear and logical responsibility for service delivery
Comprehensible:	easy to understand who does what
Visible Value:	perceived return on tax dollars
Cost Effective:	efficient delivery of appropriate quality service

PROPOSED WORK AND CONSULTATION PLAN

** There will be need for consultation at every phase and for every step in the process. Information must flow to and from members of the public, interest groups, Municipalities, Region and the media. Each member of the Citizens' Panel will be available to meet with Ottawa-Carleton residents and to answer media's questions on their work.
