2. CITIZENS' REVIEW PANEL ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT RESTRUCTURING IN OTTAWA-CARLETON: WORK AND CONSULTATION PLAN AND BUDGET

- Chief Administrative Officer's report dated 10 Oct 97

The Chief Administrative Officer, Mr. M. Beckstead, expressed his support and that of his fellow Executive Officers, Mssrs. J. Burke (City of Ottawa) and N. Lathrop (Township of Cumberland), for the Budget and Workplan submitted for approval. He noted that the regional representatives, Chair P. Clark and Councillors B. McGarry and A. Munter, also support the Panel's recommendations.

Ms. Grete Hale, Co-Chair of the Citizens' Review Panel, introduced Ms. M. Wilkinson, Ms. P. Feltmate, Ms. C. Chowaniec and Mr. L. Franceschini, panel members. Ms. Hale acknowledged the assistance of Mr. B. O'Gorman, Deputy Clerk, in helping the panel begin its work. She said the panel has been given an awesome responsibility and she expressed the hope its recommendations would be approved by the required triple majority. She spoke about each panel member being partnered with a municipality and with various interest groups as a direct link.

Ms. Hale described the Mission, Vision and Goal of the Citizens' Review Panel as follows:

Mission: to create a model of local governance to enable the growth and

development of Ottawa-Carleton as a healthy community balancing

economic, social and environmental requirements;

Vision: to motivate Ottawa-Carleton to continue evolving as an area internationally

recognized for its quality of life, variety of opportunities, caring, highly

qualified workforce, safety, prosperity and natural environment;

Goal: to create an integrated model that will best serve the citizens of Ottawa-

Carleton.

Ms. Hale identified the following criteria as being intrinsic to any model of governance: to be accessible, inclusive, representative, comprehensive, comprehensible, to offer visible value and to be cost effective. She outlined the timetable the panel will follow, culminating with the tabling of its recommendation in May/June 1998 and report follow-up from July through October 1998.

Ms. Hale described the panel's budget as bare-bones. She hoped certain costs would be minimized through the use of existing services. She asked that Committee members assist the panel by getting their constituents involved in the process and by helping the panel formulate the right questions.

Councillor G. Hunter asked why the budget is 66% higher than was originally envisaged. Ms. Hale compared the figures before Committee to the \$2.5 million budget of a similar group in Hamilton-Wentworth. Panel member M. Wilkinson added it appears there had been no real costing of the work required and she stressed the importance of having adequate funds to ensure thorough consultation takes place.

Councillor Hunter said it was his experience the public tends to be reactive as opposed to proactive in matters of governance, with those opposed being more vocal than those in support. He asked whether the proposed timeliness recognize this fact and whether it would not be preferable to prepare for a second phase of consultation. Ms. Wilkinson replied that, in January, the panel will present a number of models for public review and will continue to refine the model. Ms. C. Chowaniec noted that Phase VI, Final Report Follow-Up, has been added to encourage and organize discussion, to assist with the transition plan and to fine-tune the recommendation without having to "go back to the drawing board".

Councillor Hunter wanted to know why the panel felt it necessary to ensure provincial legislation is passed, since this could bring about a loss of local control. He expressed the hope the panel would not hesitate to ask for any required change that will help get the job done. Mr. L. Franceschini indicated the panel will ask for changes should it feel these are required. He added that both the group from Hamilton-Wentworth and Mr. Gardner Church have said the panel's task will be difficult, nonetheless members want to go beyond simply proposing a solution.

Councillor A. Munter posited that spending \$125,000 on a citizen-led consultative process represents a wise investment if it can bring about an acceptable solution. He wished the panel well and pledged to assist in any way possible. Councillor B. McGarry said the original budget was speculative and the revised budget is not unreasonble if it brings about a made-in-Ottawa-Carleton solution. Chair Clark pointed out that, while the issue may not be totally resolved, the panel will put local government restructuring in a realistic framework. He added that Council is being asked to spend half of what has already been spent by other municipalities on various scenarios and possibilities.

Councillor A. Loney expressed the view the proposed budget is too low. He emphasized the importance of having the resources to communicate effectively: to achieve this goal, the panel should feel free to approach the new Council for any additioal funding it feels is required.

Councillor D. Holmes said Council asked the panel to develop a workplan and set a budget because it felt the original estimate would not bring about the kind of solid economic analysis of the various options Council can stand behind with authority. The Chief Administrative Officer, M. Beckstead, reiterated an earlier offer of in-kind assistance and he said he hoped the panel would approach his office and that of area municipalities if some activities can be undertaken at staff level.

Councillor B. Hill said the upcoming changes will be the most important since the Region was created in 1969, and will be history-making. She hoped that community of interests would be recognized as an important factor. She was concerned there would not be enough public meetings to cover the 11 municipalities and she asserted one meeting will not be sufficient to cover the Western Townships. Ms. P. Feltmate said she agreed with Councillor Hill, however she noted the panel will form partnerships with local groups and intends to have several afternoon and evening meetings, possibly as individual panel members.

Councillor van den Ham said he supported the panel's goals and he pledged to assist in any way possible. He reiterated his disappointment with the fact there is no rural representative among its members. Chair Clark applauded the efforts that have gone into the process to-date.

6. SNOW AND ICE CONTROL ROUTE PLANNING AND OPTIMIZATION - SCOPE CHANGE

Councillor B. Hill asked whether the words "route planning and optimization" mean there will be cuts to maintenance in rural municipalities to cover the maintenance of the 254 lane kilometers of highway being transferred to the Region in 1998. The Environment and Transportation Commissioner, M. Sheflin, replied in the negative, noting the department is moving from manual route planning to computer-generated route planning. The 1996 budget was reduced by \$1.5 million on the basis that the use of technology in routing would permit the Region to maintain the same level on a statistical ten-year running average. Councillor Hill pointed out that new routing did not necessarily mean better service. Mr. Sheflin indicated the routing will maintain the level of service chosen by Council.

Responding to further questions from Councillor Hill about the highway assumptions, Mr. Sheflin said the transition funds received were sufficient to carry the Region through 1997 but not to cover capital costs. It is expected an additional \$1.9 million will be received in 1998 for capital and current expenditures, however some budget shortfalls are anticipated. The Province has promised to provide all the required funds to pay for downloaded services through Transfer Payments.

That the Corporate Services and Economic Development Committee and Council approve the scope changes to Phase II of the assignment with PSR Group Limited, Nepean, for the engineering services for Snow and Ice Control Route Planning and Optimization, in the amount of \$10,000, bringing the revised total contract provision to \$85,000.

That the Corporate Services and Economic Development Committee approve the consideration by the CS&ED Committee at this time of late agenda item No. 14, Implications of Bills 106 and 149 (Fair Municipal Finance Acts: Parts 1 and 2), on the Municipalities in Ottawa-Carleton.

In reply to questions posed by Councillor Hunter regarding Payment-in-Lieu of taxes (PIL) the Finance Commissioner, Mr. J. LeBelle, said that, because of the coming jurisdictional changes, the Region will get a greater share of tax revenues. He agreed with Councillor Hunter that the net result will be the same for taxpayers, but because of the uncertainty about the Province's intentions re: PIL's, municipalities have been asking for definite statements from the government.

Regional Chair P. Clark said it was important to recognize that changes such as the cancellation of the Business Occupancy tax and the new rate for cancelled taxes, when blended across the Region, will have an impact on many individuals. He said the report was a good way of bringing these issues to the fore. He added that the concern of area treasurers is that PIL revenues will find their way into provincial coffers and could be redirected to other provincial programs at the local taxpayer's expense.

Moved by R. van den Ham

That the Corporate Services and Economic Development Committee recommend Council approve the report produced by the consulting firm Hemson and Associates entitled *Report on the Implications of Bills 106 and 149 (Fair Municipal Finance Act: Parts 1 and 2)* on the Municipalities in Ottawa-Carleton, and that the concerns and recommended actions listed be endorsed, and that the report be sent to the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs as Council's response to the legislation.

Speaking to Bill 160, *The Education Quality Improvement Act*, Councillor A. Munter said the Bill attempts to harmonize residential and multi-residential properties and decrees that the rate will be the same, regardless of what municipalities decide to do with the rest of the property tax bill. This will mean a \$70 increase of property taxes for single family homeowners and a significant decrease for owners of large buildings, with no mechanism in the legislation to pass the decrease on to tenants in the form of lower rents.

Councillor Munter proposed a Motion calling for this provision to be taken out of Bill 160 and asking that the education mill rate be collected on the same basis as the rest of the property tax bill. When Council decides in March 1998 what the factors of assessment should be, these would apply as well to the education mill rate, thereby ensuring there are not two ways of collecting taxes and negating the projected increase alluded to earlier.

The Finance Commissioner, J. LeBelle, confirmed the proposed Motion does address the issue, and he recommended it be forwarded to the Province along with the Hemson Report. Chair Clark pointed out that, in the last six years, regional taxpayers have had increases of approximately \$20 in the first year, netting off to \$11 in the second year: this means that, over a five year period, regional taxpayers have had zero tax increases. Chair Clark compared these figures to the estimated \$70 increase taxpayers will face without being consulted in any manner. He commended Councillor Munter for this suggestion, and he asked that the Committee support the Motion.

WHEREAS Bill 160 (the education reform legislation) includes provision for the province setting education property tax rates;

WHEREAS the legislation will tax apartment buildings and single family dwellings on the same basis, thus increasing taxes on single homes in Ottawa-Carleton by an average of at least \$70 per household while decreasing property taxes for landlords;

WHEREAS there is nothing in Bill 160 nor in any other piece of legislation to allow tenants, municipalities or the province to ensure tax decreases are passed along to tenants in the form of lower rents;

WHEREAS Regional Council will decide in 1998 how much of the tax burden each class of assessment (residential, multi-residential, business, industrial, etc.) should bear and this might well be different from the provisions of Bill 160, resulting in the collection of education property taxes on a completely different basis than the collection of the rest of the property tax bill;

WHEREAS taxpayers can not afford this potential tax increase on top of potential provincial property tax increases caused by downloading;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Regional Council requests that the provincial government drop the provisions of Bill 160 that would harmonize residential and multi-residential property taxes and allow upper-tier councils to establish these factors, just as these councils will be required by provincial law to do for municipal property taxes; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT copies of this resolution be forwarded to all local MPP's, all eleven local municipalities, the Ministers of Education and Municipal Affairs, all three party leaders, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and all regional governments.

27. SALE OF SURPLUS LAND FOR PARK PURPOSES WEST HUNT CLUB ROAD AND KNOXDALE ROAD

- Planning and Development Approvals Commissioner's report dated 15 Oct 97

Councillor G. Hunter made reference to the fact that Nepean Mayor Ben Franklin will be stepping down after 19 years of valuable public service both at the municipal and regional level in Ottawa-Carleton. Councillor Hunter said that, for some time, he had felt it would be appropriate for both the RMOC and the City of Nepean to jointly develop some kind of

physical facility as a tribute to Mayor Franklin, and he had been encouraged to pursue this matter. He explained that the proposal was to use regional lands, surplus to requirements for the West Hunt Club Road, and now designated in the Regional Official Plan (ROP) as Urban Open Space, and put them to practical use as a recreational space. The RMOC would convey the lands to Nepean for a nominal consideration; Nepean would undertake a public consultation process to develop the lands as a playing field or for other recreational purposes. Partnerships would be sought from businesses and other interested parties to minimize the cost to taxpayers.

Councillor Hunter said he thought the proposal represents the best use for lands designated Urban Open Space. He added it was regretable the matter became a political football, as there has been agreement among all the parties concerned this would be a good way of paying tribute, in a timely manner, to an outstanding public servant for both the Region and the City of Nepean.

That the Corporate Services and Economic Development Committee and Council:

- 1. Declare approximately 49 acres of land being part of Lots 29 and 30, Concession 2, Rideau Front, geographic Township of Nepean, now City of Nepean, and shown on the attached sketch (Annex A) as Knoxdale east and Knoxdale west, surplus to Regional needs;
- 2. Approve the conveyance of the lands described in Recommendation 1, to the City of Nepean for the sum of \$1.00, subject to the land being used for the purpose of a public park to be named in honour of Mayor Ben Franklin.
