COUNCIL MINUTES

The Council of the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton met at Haydon Hall, Regional Headquarters, 111 Lisgar Street, Ottawa on Wednesday, 11 September, 1996 at 1:30 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. and opened in prayer.

The Regional Chair, Peter D. Clark, presided.

ALL MEMBERS WERE PRESENT.

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

The minutes of the Regular Council meeting of 10 July 1996 were confirmed.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST ARISING FROM PRIOR MEETINGS OF COUNCIL AND COMMITTEES

No declarations of interest were filed.

CEREMONIAL ACTIVITIES

The Chair, Peter D. Clark called upon the Chief Administrative Officer, Mr. Merv Beckstead, to come forward and join him in presenting a certificate of bravery to Mr. John Timpson. Mr. Timpson, a Utility Coordinator in the Region's Water Division, and captain of Goulbourn Township's Volunteer Fire Department, entered a burning house in Stittsville. He found Mrs. Bright, who was on the floor surrounded by flames and dragged her out of the home, saving her life. On behalf of Regional Council, Chair Clark announced he was very proud to present this certificate to Mr. Timpson, who acted above and beyond the call of duty.

COMMUNICATIONS*

- I. Benoit Laroche, Census Manager, on behalf of Statistics Canada, extending appreciation for the Region's support of the 1996 Census. The Region made a significant contribution in promoting the Census and providing information to the public.
- II. Mary Catherine Lindberg, Assistant Deputy Minister, Ministry of Health, responding to the Region's recommendations with respect to provincial policy changes to the Drug Benefit Programs. The changes are based on an individual's ability to pay and as a result, 140,000 more low-income earners will be able to receive assistance with unmanageable drug costs. The Ministry's Special Drugs Program is currently under review and no additional drugs or chronic disease conditions will be included in the program at this time. Community Services Committee Report No. 25, approved by Regional Council on 24 April 1996, refers.
- III. Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) forwarding their presentation to the Standing Committee on Social Development regarding Bill 76, *Environment Assessment* and Consultation Improvement Act, 1996.
- IV. Ghislaine Monette, extending thanks to the Region, on behalf of the parents of pupils who attend St-Laurent school in Carlsbad Springs, for approving a four-way stop installed at the intersection of Russell and Boundary Roads. She feels the vehicle speed has been greatly reduced, thereby increasing the safety for the school children and residents of the village.

- V. The Honourable David Dingwall, Minister of Health, responding to the Region's correspondence concerning Bill C-222, amendments to the *Food and Drugs Act*, to require warning labels on containers of alcoholic beverages. He advises that since 1992, initiatives have been made to address the various aspects of fetal alcohol syndrome, through brochures, conferences, workshops and a national symposium. There are still a number of questions about this Bill that need to be answered. He therefore supports the ongoing study of the Bill by the Standing Committee on Health. Item 3 of Community Services Committee Report No. 29, approved by Regional Council on 12 June 1996, refers.

- VII. David Brault, President, The Humane Society of Ottawa-Carleton, advising they are working with staff at the Region on solutions for funding Animal Pound services in 1997. They would like to play a more pro-active role at both staff and board levels in an effort to avoid closing a facility which aids residents and animals.
- VIII. Wayne Beaudoin, Manager, Government Relations & Major Accounts, Laidlaw Waste Systems, responding to a recent article that appeared in the Ottawa Sun, criticizing Regional Headquarters for not recycling all of the items allowed in the residential blue box. The article insinuated that Laidlaw was the contractor for these services. He wishes to clarify that Laidlaw is not the contractor supplying the commercial recycling services to 111 Lisgar.

- IX. Bryon Wilfert, newly elected President, Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) with updates from the recent conference in Calgary. He invites comments and suggestions.
- X. Grete Hale, President and Barbara McInnes, Executive Director of the Community Foundation of Ottawa-Carleton forwarding a copy of their annual report which provides an overview of the activities and financial status of the Foundation to the end of 1995.
- XI. Outaouais Urban Community forwarding a copy of a resolution adopted by their Members of Council, informing there is nothing to be gained by meeting with the R.M.O.C. on the widening of the Champlain Bridge. As such, they reject the request by R.M.O.C. to participate in such an information session. Item 5, Transportation Committee Report No. 32, approved by Regional Council on 10 July 1996, refers.
- XII. National Capital Commission advising the NCC Board of Directors approved a motion to have a public meeting organized by the CUO and RMOC on interprovincial traffic, with a specific focus on the Champlain Bridge. NCC Commission Members are to be invited to attend as part of the audience. The timing of the meeting shall be 3 September 1996 for the Intention of Decision and 15 October 1996 for the final decision. 1. <u>"NEW DIRECTIONS" DISCUSSION PAPER ON TENANT PROTECTION</u> LEGISLATION

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS AS AMENDED

That the RMOC respond to the Provincial Government's consultation paper "New Directions" on proposed tenant protection legislation by adopting the following Resolutions:

<u>1.</u> WHEREAS the RMOC has 46% of its population in rental housing (among the highest municipalities in Ontario);

<u>WHEREAS</u> regional staff, in their *Background Paper on Rental Housing in Ottawa-Carleton*, have indicated that there is currently a crisis in the supply of affordable rental housing in Ottawa-Carleton;

WHEREAS according to provincial studies, each year 25% of tenants move, with the effect that within 5 years over 70% of rental units have new tenants;

<u>THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT rent control be</u> <u>consistently applied to both occupied and vacant units.</u>

2. <u>WHEREAS since 1976, the RMOC's Official Plan has had a policy</u> (Section 6.2.2.2, policy 8) governing rental housing conversion, permitting such conversions only when vacancy rates exceed 3% in order to protect rental housing stock;

<u>WHEREAS</u> regional staff, in their *Background Paper on Rental Housing in Ottawa-Carleton* have indicated that there is currently a crisis in the supply of affordable rental housing in Ottawa-Carleton;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the RMOC continue to have the authority to control the loss of rental units due to conversions;

<u>AND THAT the RMOC continue to have the ability to impose</u> <u>conditions when dealing with such proposals.</u>

WHEREAS municipalities in Ottawa-Carleton are currently examining various models of municipal governance for the region;

WHEREAS there exists an opportunity to present to the public a range of choices in municipal structure, in order to elicit their preference, through placing a question (or series of questions) on the ballot for the 1997 municipal elections;

WHEREAS one municipality in Ottawa-Carleton has indicated its interest in placing such a question on its ballot for the 1997 municipal elections;

WHEREAS in order to assure full and fair debate across the region, and the participation of all electors throughout the region, on the matter of the most appropriate municipal governance for Ottawa-Carleton, it is preferable that a common question (or series of questions) be placed on the ballot for all municipalities in Ottawa-Carleton for the 1997 municipal elections;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton endorse the concept of a common question (or series of questions) on the topic of municipal governance for Ottawa-Carleton to be placed on the ballot for all the municipalities in Ottawa-Carleton for the 1997 municipal elections;

THAT this position be communicated to all municipal councils within Ottawa-Carleton, inviting their participation in developing a common question (or series of questions) on this matter;

THAT the Regional Chair approach the Ottawa-Carleton Mayors' Forum to discuss the process by which such a question (or series of questions) could be developed;

THAT such a question (or series of questions) should include (at least) reference to one-tier government, other forms of possible municipal governance (i.e. 3 cities, etc.), and the status quo;

AND THAT the Regional Chair report to Regional Council on progress made in this regard no later than the first Regional Council meeting in October, 1996.

At the request of the Mover and Seconder, and with the consent of Council, Motion No. 245 was amended by deleting reference to the Regional Chair approaching the Ottawa-Carleton Mayor's Forum to discuss process and by changing the date from October to December 1996 for a report back to Council.

As amended by the foregoing, Motion No. 245 was then DEFERRED BY THE FOLLOWING MOTION:

WHEREAS under existing legislation, election ballots, plebiscites, and, in particular, the wording of such plebiscites, are within the exclusive jurisdiction of the area municipalities;

WHEREAS the Minister of Municipal Affairs has indicated his intention to introduce a new Municipal Act and amendments to the Elections Act that would confer such jurisdiction to regional municipalities;

WHEREAS the City of Ottawa Council has deferred further consideration of a report by its Chief Administrative Officer entitled Municipal Government Reform -One-Tier Government Review pending consultation with other area municipalities on the proposal of a plebiscite with a common set of questions;

WHEREAS given the absence of a public report, it would seem the results of the above mentioned consultation have not yet been finalized, and;

WHEREAS there has yet to be an agreement, between the Mayors of the eleven area municipalities, on a common set of questions;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Regional Council defer consideration of Motion No. 245 until such a time as the Minister of Municipal Affairs has introduced a new Municipal Act and made the necessary amendments to the Elections Act thus conferring upon Regional Municipalities legislated authority in this matter.

WHEREAS in addition to its agricultural function, the Farm is distinguished by the presence of dozens of buildings of architectural and heritage interest;

WHEREAS the Farm has established a tradition of sharing its Ornamental Gardens, Arboretum, livestock, buildings and fields with the residents of our Region, and has been a big part of our tourist industry over many years;

WHEREAS the Federal Government of Canada has indicated that the Central Experimental Farm may soon be dismantled and some of the historic buildings on the site considered for demolition;

WHEREAS the dismantling of the lands will ultimately result in the disposal of extra land or lands declared surplus to the interests of Agriculture Canada;

WHEREAS the City of Ottawa has endorsed a recommendation of the Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee to preserve this historic site;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton request the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada to examine the Central Experimental Farm for designation as a cultural landscape of national historic significance and communicate to the Federal Government the need to preserve this historic site.

AND WHEREAS Canada is working with other like-minded states and with Canadian and international non-governmental organizations (NGO's) to promote a rapidly growing international campaign which seeks to effect a comprehensive global ban on APMs;

AND WHEREAS the Ministers of Foreign Affairs and Defence announced a Canadian moratorium on the production, export and operational use of APMs;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT Regional Council extend its congratulations to the Ministers of Foreign Affairs and Defence for taking international leadership in announcing the moratorium;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Regional Council support the initiatives taken by the Canadian Government in banning APMs;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Regional Council encourage area municipalities to enact by-laws which would ban APMs and in so doing make Ottawa-Carleton Canada's first officially land-mine free zone.
