2010 - 2011 Implications to Service

The following events affected service in 2011:

- The main floor of the Ruth E. Dickinson branch was closed for renovations from February 22 until May of 2011. The second floor of the Library was open for business and some services were modified.
- The Alta Vista branch was closed from September 7, 2010 to January 21, 2011 for renovations resulting in the loss of 18 service days.
- The Carlingwood branch was closed January 24 to January 26 due to a heating issue which resulted in the loss of 3 days of service.
- The Manotick branch was temporarily closed for renovations from January 25 to January 26 which resulted in the loss of 2 days of service.
- A technical issue impacted website availability in the first week of September 2011 resulting in a decrease in the number of web visits.
- The kiosk containing juvenile materials was closed for five weeks (late November to second week of December) as a result of vandalism.

The following events affected service in 2010:

- The Sunnyside branch closed November 30, 2009 for 259 days for renovations and reopened August 16, 2010. During the renovation, an extended loan period was applied and a basic library service was provided at the Coliseum Building at Lansdowne Park through a depot that was open for 208 service days.
- The Cumberland branch closed for renovations on January 19, 2010 for 147 service days and reopened June 8, 2010 and an extended loan period was applied. This extended loan period had a negative impact on the renewals.
- In Q2 of 2010, the Ottawa Public Library underwent a major system upgrade. The upgrade took place April 12 through to May 4, 2010. All branches of the OPL were closed to the public from May 3 to May 6, 2010 for the system upgrade. All branches re-opened on Friday, May 7, 2010.
- From April 21 to May 5, 2010, the holds system for the Ottawa Public Library was shut down to accommodate the system upgrade. To assist patrons affected by the closures, a 6 week loan period for all materials that were checked out from April 1 to April 21, 2010 was applied.

- The Vanier branch closed on June 28, 2010 to allow for renovations. The branch reopened to the public on November 20, 2010 after having been closed for 44 service days.
- The Alta Vista branch closed on September 7, 2010 to allow for renovations. The branch reopened to the public on Friday, January 21, 2011 after having been closed for 79 service days.

2011 Annual Statistics

1. Total Uses

Total uses refer to the number of discrete instances when library service is accessed. This measure comes from the Ontario Municipal Benchmarking survey based on data submitted by OPL. This measure is calculated by summing the following library services:

- Annual circulation
- Annual program attendance
- Annual in-library use of materials
- Annual computer workstation uses
- Annual electronic database uses
- Annual reference transactions
- Annual library visits
- Annual virtual visits

Table 1 provides Total Uses. In 2011, the total uses were 36,698,944, an increase of 9.1% over 2010.

2. Circulation

This section characterizes OPL circulation in 2011 compared to 2010. The Ottawa Public Library lends out materials through 33 branches, 2 bookmobiles, 2 kiosks, 1 mobile unit and a digital download service.

2.1 Circulation by Branch

Table 2 provides annual circulation statistics for all OPL branches, bookmobile service, homebound services and digital downloads. Digital downloads included downloadable e-books, audio books and music. First-time circulation accounts for 76.8% of total circulation, while circulation from renewals accounts for 23.2%. Between 2010 and 2011 total circulation increased by 5.65%.

2.2 Circulation by Bookmobile Stop

Table 3 provides annual first-time circulation data for bookmobile stops. Bookmobile circulation accounts for 1.4% of annual first-time circulation. Between 2010 and 2011 total Bookmobile circulation increased 2.1%.

2.3 Circulation of French Language Materials

OPL is the largest officially bilingual (French-English) public library in North America. Ottawa has the second-highest percentage of people who speak both French and English of any major Canadian city, behind Montreal (Source: Statistics on www.ottawa.ca). In 2006, 14.9% of the residents of Ottawa reported that their mother tongue was French (2006 Census, Statistics Canada). In 2006, 15.7% of the residents of Ottawa reported that their first official language spoken was French (2006 Census, Statistics Canada), which is the guideline used for the OPL collection development policy as approved by the Board in March 2009.

Table 4 provides annual first-time circulation data for French materials by branch. In both 2011 French language materials accounted for 11.3% of total circulation. Between 2011 and 2010 total French circulation increased 13.1%.

2.4 Circulation of World Language Materials

Data is provided separately for the nine world languages that the OPL currently and actively collects. The category 'Other World Languages' includes circulation of all other world language materials.

Table 5 provides annual circulation data for world language materials by language. There are a number of small collections in various languages that make up a portion of the collection which have been grouped together under 'Other World Languages'. In 2011, circulation of world language materials accounted for 3.8% of total circulation. The circulation of World language materials in 2011 decreased by 1.7% when compared to 2010.

3. Electronic Usage

Traditional library usage has evolved to incorporate the convenience of remote access via the Internet. OPL offers a range of virtual services, including on-line browsing of the catalogue, downloadable audio books, ebooks and music and access to virtual information through library databases. Access to a computer has become essential for personal communication, research and job-hunting. This section characterizes usage of electronic offerings at OPL.

3.1 Virtual Visits

A virtual visit is defined as a single session originated on the OPL website, the OPL children's website or in the on-line library catalogue. In 2011, OPL had 14,993,291 virtual visits, an increase of 20.3% over the 12,468,060 virtual visits in 2010. The increase in virtual visits to the Ottawa Public Library website can be attributed to an increased reliance on web based library tools found on the website since the system upgrade in May 2010.

3.2 Public Access Computer Usage

OPL has 412 public access computers at its 33 branches. The computers provide high-speed Internet access and a variety of software applications, including Acrobat Reader, Excel, MS Paint, PowerPoint, Word and MSN Messenger. OPL cardholders can book public access computers for up to two hours per day. This service is particularly important to residents who otherwise could neither access the Internet nor a computer for document preparation (for example, job-hunters preparing resumés).

In 2011, 903,580 sessions were initiated on public access computers. This represents an increase of 0.4% over the 900,046 sessions initiated in 2010.

3.3 Wireless Internet Sessions

The Ottawa Public Library has wireless Internet service available at all 33 branches. In 2011, 144,669 wireless Internet sessions were initiated on the OPL's wireless Internet network, an increase of 36.1% over the 106,329 sessions initiated in 2010.

3.4 Total Internet usage

Total Internet usage is the total number of combined Internet sessions initiated on OPL's public computers and the wireless network. In 2011, 1,048,249 Internet sessions were initiated on the Ottawa Public Library network. This represents an increase of 4.2% over the 1,006,375 sessions initiated in 2010.

3.5 Library Database Usage

Library databases provide electronic access to the most recent articles from newspapers, magazines and reference resources. OPL offers access to 79 separate database products. Library databases are available in English, French and Chinese. The products offered range from Tumblebooks, which are targeted at pre-schoolers, through academic research targeted at children and teens, to a wide-range of offerings for adults.

A database access is a unique session established with a library database, regardless of the number of searches or the number of articles consulted during the session. In 2011, 99,917 sessions were initiated on OPL databases, a decrease of 3.5% over the 103,579 sessions initiated in 2010.

3.6 Electronic Media Downloads

OPL offers audio books, electronic books and music for access on personal handheld devises e.g. MP3's, iPods and Sony Readers.

In 2011 patrons downloaded 261,358 items, an increase of 205% over the 85,572 items downloaded in 2010. The increase is attributed to the addition of new downloadable content (music, e-books and MP3 books) and the increased popularity of the service. In 2011, Electronic Media Downloads accounted for 3.1% of first time circulation.

4. Programs and Program Attendance

A core service offering in public libraries is programming, particularly as it relates to literacy and life-long learning.

4.1 Programs Offered

OPL offers programs to residents of all ages. Programs are categorized by target audience:

- Adults (18 + yrs. old)
- Teens (13 17 yrs. old)
- Pre-schoolers Children (0 12 yrs. old)

Programs aimed at pre-schoolers and their parents or caregivers promote reading readiness. Programs aimed at children promote literacy and research skills, as do many OPL programs offered to young adults. Programs targeted at adults range from interest talks to book clubs and computer literacy workshops. In 2011, OPL offered 10,414 programs, an increase of 2.4% over the 10,165 programs offered in 2010.

Table 6 provides annual data on the number of programs offered for each target audience.

4.2 Program Usage

Table 7 provides data on total in-library programs by age group. Note that the data reflects the total number of attendees and not the number of unique attendees. In 2011, the total number of attendees increased by 5%.

5. Other Data

The Ministry of Culture, Province of Ontario mandates public libraries to hold a counting week during a full one-week period in November of each year. The data collected is used to generate annual statistics for those library output measures for which we do not have actual data. The provincially mandated formula for estimating annual data is:

counting week data X 50 = annual estimated output measure

The number 50 is used as the multiplier to correct for statutory holidays when public libraries are closed.

Ottawa Public Library relies on counting week data to estimate three annual output measures:

- 1. Library visits
- 2. In-library use of materials
- 3. Reference transactions

5.1 Library Visits

A library visit is defined as a person entering a physical library facility (e.g. the central library or a library branch) or bookmobile. The estimated number of library visits for 2011 is 5,275,850, an increase of 0.4% over the 5,254,500 estimated library visits in 2010.

5.2 In-Library Use of Materials

In-library use of materials counts the number of times that a library visitor consults a book or other type of library material in a physical library facility, but does not borrow the item consulted. In-house use of materials captures use of non-circulating reference materials as well as use of circulating materials by library visitors who use those materials in the library. The estimated number of in-house uses of materials is 1,970,900 in 2011, a decrease of 5% over the 2,074,650 estimated in-house uses in 2010.

5.3 Reference Transactions

A reference transaction is defined as an information question asked of a staff member at an information desk or virtually, using the Internet or the telephone. The estimated number of reference transactions for 2011 is 646,700, a decrease of 5.1% over the 681,750 estimated reference transactions in 2010.
